

Dan Lustig, Psy.D., CODP II, CAADC

Dan Lustig, Psy.D., is the President and CEO of Haymarket Center, Chicago's largest community-based, not-for-profit provider of comprehensive substance use treatment and behavioral health services. Dr. Lustig is a graduate of Adler University, where he earned his Psy.D. in Clinical Psychology. He has over 25 years' experience implementing quality substance abuse programs. In conjunction to his work and studies in addictions, Dr. Lustig completed the "Professional in Residence Program" at Betty Ford Center in Rancho Mirage, California.

At Haymarket Center, Dr. Lustig has oversight over the Residential Treatment, Detoxification and the Recovery Home programs and outpatient services in three locations on Chicago's North, West, and South sides. Specialty programming under his oversight includes programs for pregnant and postpartum women with children; pregnant and postpartum women under the jurisdiction of the Cook County Court system; women who are victims of human trafficking; adult men with multiple treatment episodes; methamphetamine addiction; men reentering the community from Illinois prisons; men on electronic monitoring from the Cook County Courts; and adult men and women with co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders.

Dr. Lustig is current or past Program Director on numerous federal grants, including a Family Centered Treatment program funded by the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) for pregnant and postpartum women with children that has helped reconnect children to their fathers; a five-year SAMHSA grant for implementing Motivational Enhancement Therapy into residential and outpatient treatment of Polish-speaking homeless men; a five-year U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) HIV prevention grant targeting homeless men entering Haymarket's detoxification unit; a SAMHSA Recovery Oriented Systems of Care grant to provide recovery coaching to adult men with multiple cycles through substance use residential treatment; a highly-competitive 2011 U.S. Administration for Children and Families (ACF) Pathways to Responsible Fatherhood grant to provide an array of healthy marriage, fatherhood and parenting, and economic stability services to men in recovery; and, most recently, a SAMHSA grant to extend recovery coaching and HIV risk reduction to adult men.

Dr. Lustig is the Past President, of the Illinois Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Professional Certification Association (IAODAPCA), which is responsible for certification of substance abuse counselors in Illinois. He is a current member of the Advisory Council to the Illinois Department of Human Services, Division of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse. He served on the Illinois Attorney General's Task Force on Methamphetamines; and the Executive Committee for the Governor of Illinois – Ex-Offenders Task Force. Dr. Lustig continues to serve on the State of Illinois Substance Use Advisory Council and the State of Illinois Social Service Advisory Council. Dr. Lustig's published article on "Factors Related to Changes among African American women participating in Substance Abuse Treatment" was published in 6 different languages and countries. The research supported changes in thinking surrounding high risk behaviors in women.

Dr. Lustig was recognized by John P. Walters, previous Director of ONDCP for his contributions on data collection for the field of substance abuse, Dr. Nora Volkow sitting Director of the National Institute of Drug Abuse (NIDA) for his work in bringing research to practice with

community based organizations, and was recognized in 2004 as a “Friend for Life” award recipient for his long volunteer services at Howard Brown Health Center. Previous awardees to this category include Senator Richard Durbin, Mayor Richard M. Daley, and State Representative Sara Feigenholtz. Dr. Lustig collaborated and assisted Harpo Productions and HBO on their special covering addiction and prostitution.

Dr. Lustig is a current Advisory Board member to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Service Administration (SAMHSA) in Washington DC. Lastly, Dr Lustig served on Governor Pritzker’s transition team that focused on developing a report on the needs and direction of mental health and substance use disorder services for the State of Illinois.
