When testifying as to how many calls for emergency services the proposed Itasca location would make, Haymarket reduced the number of calls from its West Loop location by about 30%, testifying this was because the proposed Itasca location is about 30% smaller. Haymarket has also testified that Itasca should expect Haymarket to have about 4700 clients each year at the Itasca proposed location. I don't understand the difference in analysis. Haymarket has testified that it currently treats about 12,000 clients a year. Haymarket has testified that a small number of those clients are in programs the Itasca location will not provide, but that would still indicate that the proposed Itasca location 70% the size would treat closer to 8,000 patients. Further, Haymarket has testified that the 12,000 clients at its West Loop location is about 80% capacity, implying the West Loop location has a capacity of 15,000 clients. However, Dr. Lustig stated in 2009 that Haymarket was treating 18,000 clients. Dr. Lustig made that statement when Governor Quinn was slashing Health and Human Services budgets, which Haymarket now says that Governor Pritzker going to start raising funding for again. So my question is, if Haymarket is treating 12,000 clients at its west loop location now, why wouldn't the Itasca location likely have 8,000-9,000 clients, and we know the west loop location can at least 18,000 clients a year, particularly when Haymarket has testified that its clients come from all over the state and just in the neighboring counties there are over 57,000 individuals in need of its services, would we expect over 12,000 clients a year at the proposed Itasca location? 1

Haymarket has testified that it has a number of satellite facilities which are primarily recovery homes of a dozen or two beds. Haymarket has also testified that the proposed Itasca location will not be a satellite location, no overflow will come from Haymarket's locations, it will be stand alone. While Haymarket has been around for 45 years, is this the first time that Haymarket has ever tried to open a 240+ bed stand alone facility? 3. Haymarket has testified, and lists on their website, that its west loop location treats primarily the homeless, indigent, and ex-offenders. Haymarket has testified that it does not believe that will be the make up of its clients at the proposed Itasca location, but we certainly have homeless, indigent and ex-offenders in the collar counties just like they do in the west loop. Has Haymarket done an analysis to support their testimony? 4. Haymarket has testified as to the number of emergency services calls it expects the proposed Itasca location will make, and has made some anecdotal references to property values around the west loop facility. Dr Lustig has also testified that he has not met with the owners of the neighboring businesses, nor travelled the route from the proposed Itasca facility to the Itasca Metra station where it is expected many of its clients will travel to get treatment. Has Haymarket done any analysis of the impact on property values, crime, and retail businesses in locations where a similar sized facility (i.e. 240 bed rehabilitation services for over 12,000 primarily homeless, indigent and ex offenders) has moved into a similar sized suburban neighborhood of 9,000 residents?
